Municipalities as Employers

- Per the provisions of the *Municipalities Act* a municipal council is viewed as an employer if the municipality has one or more “employees”
- A person acting in the capacity of “town manager” and others who oversee, direct or assign work would be considered to be supervisors from an OHS perspective





Employer Responsibilities Summarized

The employer must:

- Provide workers with the tools, equipment and safety devices they need to work safely
- Provide adequate supervision to ensure worker safety and safe work
- Maintain tools, equipment, vehicles, work facilities etc. in safe condition, this means per the manufacturer's specifications





Employer Responsibilities Summarized

The employer must:

- Provide information, instruction, and training needed to ensure an adequate knowledge of hazards, required associated safety measures and how to work safely
- Take corrective action, which includes discipline, when needed
- Perform inspections and monitoring to ensure safe work and working conditions
- Cooperate with OHS Committees, Reps and/or Designates





Supervisor Responsibilities Summarized

Supervisors must:

- Inform workers of hazards
- Provide written and verbal instructions needed to ensure safety
- Ensure workers work safely and wear needed PPE
- Monitor and inspect work to ensure safety
- Take action to address safety issues as they are identified or reported
- Keep records of what they do to ensure safety



Who is a supervisor?

Anyone who:

- Assigns work
AND/OR
- Directs when or how work is to be performed





Supervisor Training

Supervisors have a responsibility to protect their workers and keep the workplace safe. The *Newfoundland and Labrador Occupational Health and Safety Act*, Sections 5.1 and 5.2 outline the general and specific duties of a supervisor.

To achieve these duties, a supervisor should have a general understanding of occupational health and safety management.





Supervisor Health & Safety Training Standard

This certification training standard applies to:

A person who meets the definition of supervisor under Section 2 of the *Newfoundland and Labrador Occupational Health and Safety Act*

- An employer who employs a person as a supervisor
- A person who is delivering a supervisor health and safety certification training program





Supervisor Health & Safety Training Standard

By the end of the supervisor health and safety training, participants will demonstrate their understanding of and discuss:

- Health and Safety Legislation
- OH&S Programs
- Hazard Recognition, evaluation, and control
- Occupational Health and Hygiene
- Workplace Inspections
- Emergency preparedness and response
- Incident investigations
- Disability management
- OHS Program Evaluation
- PRIME





Worker Responsibilities Summarized

Employees must:

- Work safely
- Cooperate with the employer, supervisors and other workers to ensure safety
- Properly use items and PPE provided, or needed, to ensure their safety
- Consult and cooperate with workplace OHS representatives
- Immediately report identified safety issues to their supervisor
- Take appropriate action to ensure serious safety issues are properly addressed

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OHS and the Fire Service

Almost all municipal fire fighters and fire services, under provincial jurisdiction, fall under the authority of the *OHS Act* and related regulations. This includes most departments labeled as “volunteer”.



OHS and the Fire Service

“No matter what the size of your department, the safety of all members must be priority one. Firefighting, be it in a volunteer, composite or career department, falls under the regulations as outlined in the OHS Act. In general, the Act states that all employees must be trained in safe work practices and those employers must ensure that every precaution is taken to provide for the safety of its employees.





OHS and the Fire Service

“In this case, the employees are the members of the fire department and the employer is the council. Employers can and will be held accountable if found that a violation of the Act has taken place. Information on the OHS Act as it relates to Firefighters is contained in Appendix J - Minimum Training Standards”



SCBA Requirements

- Section 83

- Establish, implement, maintain and revise a respiratory protection program per the current CSA Z94.4 “Selection, Use and Care of Respirators”

- User screening
 - Fit testing required

- Section 84

- (3) ensure compressed air meets the current CSA Z180.1 “Compressed Breathing Air Systems”

- (6) and (7) rescue procedures

- Section 86

- (1) and (2) cleaning and disinfection

- (3) inspection and maintenance





Conclusion

Everything we do in safety should be focused on helping people understand why something needs to happen in a particular way. “Because it’s a Regulation” or “because it’s a Policy” isn’t enough. WHY is it a Regulation? WHY is it a Policy? If they understand why change is necessary, they can care, and if they care, they can see a reason to change.

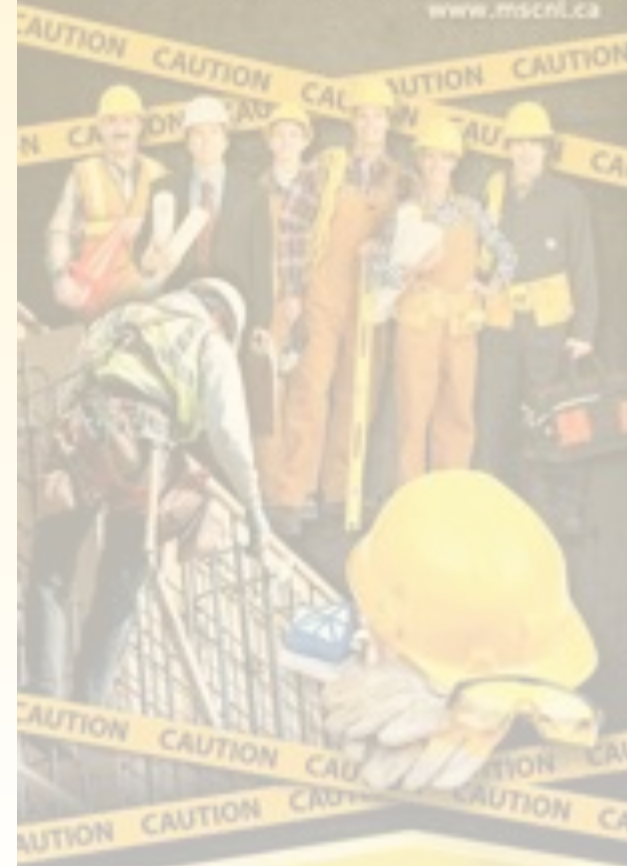
